



Sometime this month, we will celebrate the ordination and installation of new officers. These Deacons, Elders, and Trustees will carry forward the work of First Presbyterian Church until summer 2027. The date seems so far distant when I type it! By then, the 2024 Election will be over and its results history. (In fact, we'll be well into the early hype for the 2028 election.)

I remember when 2010 began, and I noted in Lake Charles that the officers installed there would serve until 2013. I had no idea I would be serving here by then. Later, when we had celebrated this church's 2016 Centennial and come through Hurricane Harvey's flooding, we had no way of knowing that before the Class of 2020 stepped down we would have to figure out how to keep up "the maintenance of divine worship" during a Pandemic when we could not meet in person. Those officers served capably. The Lord and Head of the Church led us through all those episodes and changes.

It's not that the character, experience, and gifts and graces of those we'll be ordaining and/or installing are not important. Jesus Christ is the one Person essential in every church. Where there is love and faithfulness toward God, and eagerness to be part of his ongoing mission in the world, he will lead through all sorts of troubles, provide guidance and wisdom for all manner of challenges, and provide for every type of need.

A VISION FOR 2030

After the Summer retreat, the Session formed a visioning team to think over some ideas from the meeting and to consider possible ways forward for the church. They came up with a general vision for what all taking part would like to see the church look like, say, five years down the road. For now, the specific steps and stages are under discussion. They and the Session want to share what they have so far with the whole church, and here it is below: First Presbyterian Church of Sugar Land is a joyful, mid-sized (300-400 fully engaged members) congregation, consisting of multigenerational and multi-ethnic individuals, reflecting the community it serves. The church is part of the Presbyterian USA denomination, and offers a classic Presbyterian, Bible-based ministry, focusing on a 21st century environment, in a family atmosphere.

The church is enthusiastic and active in missions that serve the needs of our community, both spiritually and tangibly. Our members do not just spread the Word, they continuously demonstrated their devotion to the Christian way in everyday life. Our church serves the community by hosting and enabling groups and organizations that seek to benefit the common good and those in need.

Our worship services emphasize the principles of Christ's teaching and the understanding of those principles. They are presented in a positive manner that clarifies those teachings in a way that is truly memorable. Hymns and music are carefully chosen to frame and accentuate the message. It is a time of joy!



The Session held its stated monthly meeting on Monday, May 13th in the Meeting Place. Besides receiving reports from the Pastor, Deacons, Stephen Ministers, Trustees, and committees, the Session...



Discussed plans for the transition in June for incoming and outgoing Deacons, Elders, and Trustees, receiving a report on the progress of the Nominating Committee;



Moderators were advised to begin preparing their Annual Reports for the Congregational Meeting to elect new officers and Nominating Committee members;



Discussed other transitions over the coming months;



Heard a report from the Visioning Team, and each Committee moderator was given opportunity to select a date to present a Minute for Mission on that committee's work at both services;



Noted that the next Presbytery Meeting will be on Saturday, July 20th, by Zoom. Elder Commissioners will be elected at the next Session meeting.

The **next Session meeting** will be on a Monday night after mid-June, at 7:00 P.M., the date depending on the election, ordination, and installation of new officers.



HURRICANE AND OTHER SEVERE WEATHER EVENT PLAN First Presbyterian Church of Sugar Land

If our area is placed under a watch or Inland Hurricane Warning...

Pastor will ask Deacons to check on people on their care lists, especially to see if anyone is evacuating where they are going, etc.

Property Committee/Church Staff prepare buildings and grounds:

Bring in any loose items (nursery playground equipment, small plastic tables in breezeway, and benches) that could blow around in high winds.

Unplug office computers, other electrical equipment to protect against power surges.

Sanctuary

Pastor or Choir Director will unplug the organ and sound system.

Trustees/Treasurer make sure checks, financial information, etc. are in a safe location, with all important records backed up electronically or by other means.

If a hurricane is approaching on a Sunday, or Sunday comes soon after...

If Ft. Bend County is under an Inland Hurricane or Tropical Storm Warning, and winds are expected to be at or above Tropical Storm Strength on a Sunday morning, no services will be held.

In the event of heavy rains or flooding conditions on a Saturday night or Sunday morning, the Pastor will use discretion in holding or cancelling services.

- 1. In the event of a "command decision" on a Saturday night, the Pastor may contact the Deacons' Moderator to ask for help in passing out word.
- 2. In the event of a last-minute cancellation—as occurred due to flooding in the Pastor's neighborhood during Hurricane Harvey—the Pastor will make every effort to contact an Elder or other Officer who can be at the sanctuary to advise anyone coming that services are cancelled, and/or to pray or otherwise minister to them.*

Otherwise, even if there is no electricity, etc., on the Sunday after a storm, services will be held—with the understanding they will probably be somewhat shorter and "come as you are", and (literally) open door.

As soon as possible after the storm passes...

Pastor and/or a designated Property Committee member survey buildings and grounds for any damage

If there is damage, report immediately to insurance. Trustees: assign a Trustee to be liaison with Insurance

Deacons/Pastor

Contact care list members, make list of anyone requiring special assistance

Session/Pastor

If there is significant damage to any building on the church campus, make arrangements for an alternate site on or off the campus for Worship, Sunday School, or Office operations.

*The particular circumstances of Hurricane Harvey will never be repeated—we all devoutly hope! But these guidelines come from that experience.

IV. OTHER SEVERE WEATHER EVENTS (flooding events, ice storms)

If an ice storm or flooding event is forecast for a Sunday morning, the Pastor and Session will consult about whether to cancel services.

If an ice storm, flooding event, or other severe weather is forecast during the work week, the Pastor will use discretion in deciding whether to close the office and will advise the Session. Staff will work from home.

HARD FREEZE PREPARATIONS—The Property Committee has an action plan for draining pipes, etc.

The Property Committee will advise on :

Setting of thermostats Setting of sprinkler system Covering of any pipes or plants

As soon as possible, Pastor and/or someone from the Property Committee will check for any broken pipes, leaks, etc.



Yes, I know it is only June and it's too early for a Thanksgiving story but it is never too early for a miracle story and this one is too good to keep till November. Ivy Olson was at the lowest point in her life. It was Thanksgiving morning 1969 and she had just moved into a one bedroom apartment with her two boys after going through a divorce. She was still in bed having just woken up and she thought to herself, "What have I gotten into? How am I gonna get out of this?"

She only had 3 hotdogs in the fridge to feed herself and her boys on this Thanksgiving Day. She decided to give her boys a treat and take them to the park for a picnic. They cooked their hotdogs in the park and ate them and played around for a little while. On the way back to the apartment, the boys complained that they were still hungry. She did not want the boys to see her worried so she put on a brave face and smiled.

On reaching the apartment complex, they were just about to go up the stairs to their apartment when a little old lady in Apartment 15 on the ground floor called out to them and said "Oh, honey? I've been waiting for you." She invited them to have Thanksgiving dinner with her. At first, Ivy thanked her and said she did not want to impose but the woman insisted and said she really would love the company. Hesitantly, Ivy agreed and she and the boys went into the apartment and found a baked whole turkey with all the trimmings laid out on the dinner table.

The apartment was nicely furnished and Ivy immediately felt at home in the woman's apartment. She described the experience in detail, "It was all dimly lit, and the kitchen table was just loaded with food. And she was just so incredibly sweet. Her presence was like electricity. She had a sparkle in her eyes. There was life in her." The woman was easy to talk to and they had a wonderful meal. At the end of the evening, the woman gave little gifts to each of them and sent them home with all the leftovers. Ivy was so grateful and excited since there was enough food to last them the whole week.

The next morning, Ivy went to return the containers to the woman in Apartment 15. She knocked on the door but there was no answer. She looked in the windows and the apartment was dark and empty and looked like no one had lived in it for a while. She went to the apartment manager's door and knocked and when he answered, she asked where the lady in Apartment 15 had gone. He told her that Apartment 15 has been vacant for 10 to 12 weeks and looked at her as if she was crazy. He asked, "Are you feeling okay?" "Even today I get goose bumps when I think back on just seeing that empty apartment," she reminisced on that encounter with the woman who Ivy believed must have been an angel. She vowed that she would one day do something to help others just as that angel had helped her.

Ivy met her current husband, Douglas Olson, an Air Force chaplain, at the Tahitian Lanai while she was vacationing with friends in Hawaii. "We met and she never went home," he said. They were married in 1976. In 1989, Olson founded Angel Network Charities, which became a \$700,000-a-year nonprofit serving more than 100 homeless families in Hawaii. The organization helps its clients gain the means to live independently through housing, health care, transportation and job training assistance.

Her husband, who was now senior pastor of Calvary by the Sea Lutheran Church in Aina Haina described Ivy as the moving force -- "she was a very, very powerful lady" -- behind the Angel Network. She received a President George Bush's Thousand Points of Light award in 1992, and a Volunteer of the Year award from President Bill Clinton in 1993, he said. Her story also inspired the pilot for the CBS television series, "Touched By An Angel" which aired in 1994.

Ivy Olson passed away from intestinal cancer on April 7, 2002. She was 60. But her legacy lives on in the Angel Charities Network which continues to help families in need to this day on Oahu, Hawaii.

Sorry, I Can't Come, I Have Other Plans

The Gospel of Luke tells an interesting story about a man who planned to host a large banquet. He invited many people. When the preparations were complete and the party was ready to start, he sent his servant out to tell all the invited guests that it was now time to come enjoy the food and festivities.

One of the invited guests sent regrets because he had to check on a piece of land he had recently bought. Another invited guest sent regrets because he had acquired some oxen and he could not wait to hitch them up and try them out. A third invited guest sent regrets because he was just married and would be unable to join the feast.

When the servant told the banquet host that his invited guests were declining, the host became angry. He told his servant to go into the streets and alleys and invite regular people. And they came.

When the newly invited people found seats at the banquet, the servant told the host there was still room for even more people. So, the host sent his servant back out to the roadways and country lanes to invite more people to the dinner party (Luke 14:15-24).

I like to think of this parable from the perspective of those who were first invited. They had received an invitation from a man who must have been an important person (common people do not throw parties like that). So, you would think the invitees would have been honored and grateful to have been on the guest list. But they did not care enough about this man to send their regrets as soon as they got the invitation. Rather, they let the host go through all the party preparations, and only then begged off attending at the last minute. And they gave some pretty flimsy excuses at that.

When God invites me to participate in Kingdom work, I sometimes wonder if I am like those who begged off attending that man's dinner party. I should be honored and grateful to be invited to partner with God in Kingdom work. And I certainly should be embarrassed to beg off participating in Kingdom work with a flimsy excuse like needing to check on a plot of land I just bought, or to take a spin in my new car, or needing to help my spouse put away our wedding gifts.

Here is the faith lesson to remember: When we decline God's invitation to partner with God in Kingdom work, it does not stop Kingdom work from happening. God just offers our invitation to someone else who will gratefully accept the invitation.

APRIL REVENUES and EXPENSES

Total revenues for the month of April 2024 were LESS than the budgeted forecast and expenses were MORE than the budgeted forecast. The year-to-date revenue minus expense resulted in a negative \$24,924.34. The pledged revenue for April 2024 was \$5,463.67 LESS than the budgeted amount. The loose offering for April 2024 was \$1,951.35 LESS than the budgeted amount. This financial information pertains to only the Operating account. This account includes payments or donations for flowers, camps and conferences, event fees and missions, along with pledges and loose offerings.

The Repair, Maintenance and Special Projects Fund (RMSP) was previously identified as the Capital Improvement Fund. The \$53,149.84 reflected in this fund includes the following:

\$2,402.51 for the Presbyterian Vision Initiative Grant for playground equipment. \$504.67 given for new chairs in the meditation room in memory of Elaine Brasher. \$813.54 from the Technology Grant from the Presbytery. \$10,499.26 for God's Backyard. RMSP Funds available as of February 29, 2024, are **\$38,929.86**.

The **De George at Union Station** is a non-profit organization that provides a "forever home atmosphere" for formerly homeless veterans, both male and female of any age, with no time limits on length of stay. They work with the veterans to identify any mental and/or physical health needs and then to find service providers and treatment options. The De George makes many basic services available to the vets in residence including computer station, copy machine, van transportation for medical appointments, emergency food pantry and new

household items upon arrival (bed linens, towels, hygiene kits, etc.). Our Church has supported the needy veterans in many ways to include moneys for needed items, BBQ Day and providing other supporting activities.
